## Cruicetown Report

Page 27. A more sigificant alienation of the property took place in 1789 when immediately following the release and reconveyance by Forde to Joseph Cruse, the latter granted for an unrecorded cosideration to Arthur Ahmuty of the city of London 'all those manor towns and lands of Cruisetown, Moydarragh and Altmash' including a parcel of land known as 'Ballyhulgh' (Ballahulk).

Ahmuty who died (6 **Dec 1793** aged 63 Dinapore) within a few years of acquiring the Cruicetown estate (co. Meath) is stated in a later deed to have been a retired Colonel formerly in the service of the East India Co and was resident in 1789 in Harley Street, London.

Ahmuty left his property to his widow Ursula and in trust for his son Robert, both of whom are later described as resident in Dublin. This transaction appers to have marked the end of the Cruise family's role as the landed proprietors of Cruietown but it did not end their involvement with the townland and the parish.

The Ahmuty heirs granted a number of important 31 year leases in 1799, two of them to Peter Cruise of Moydorragh, who leased some 280 acres comprising lands commonly called Legacavan

Page 28. The **Ahmuty** family ceased to be landlords of Cruicetown in **1831** when a sale was made under decreee of the Court of Chancery in Ireland. The executors of the will of William Alexander **Shaw** late of Great Denmark Street, Dublin purchased for 38,500 pounds the manor town and lands of Cruicetown, Moydorragh and Altmash, including a parcel of land called Ballyhulk . . and all and every tenement and farm known and reputed to be part thereof.

Ursula Ahmuty died 27 January 1818 at Sackville Street, Dublin

## Ship Maria 1798

Captain Bishop of the Maria left Bengal the 26th July (1797); put into Poolo Penang in distress the 20th August; failed thence the 1st October, and arrived at the Cape the 14th December.

The Maria left at Poolo Penang the Company's ships Lord Camden, Busbridge, Sir Stephen Lusshington, and Princess Mary, bound to Bengal; also the Phoenix for Madras; and Asia, Earl Talbot and Ceres for China

The passengers abroad the Maria were Capt Storey and Messrs Saunders and Ahmuty X

True Briton, Cuffnells, Henry Addington, Woodford, Royal Charlotte, Walmer Castle and Maria left St Helena the 8th January (1798) at which time they were no ships remaining at that island. Their arrival at this time may be deemed particularly fortunate, as the price of tea at the Company's sales was remarkable high
